### **Cruiseship** impressions

Education of guides and training of tourists – observations and interviews

- Mandatory video on board the ship, about behavior on and around CH sites and in nature, and site specific guidelines
- Guides embarked first, high level of knowledge, indicated where the tourists could walk; tourists followed up
- Development since 2019: increased focus on behavior and sustainability

# Wear and tear; tourists impact on CH and nature

- Heavy traffic, huge impact on vulnerable wooden structures and nature;
- Observed CH structures less damaged than expected (according to traffic load, and impact on nature);
- Pathways should be used, here it is «overused»
- Increased traffic leaves traces.

- Increased consiousness on behavior and sustainability (site specific guidelines) since 2019

- Difficult to understand what are actually cultural heritage
